


The Inn, Weddings, Our Property & More...

We are a boutique Inn + Spa located in Milton NY, on a 75 acre estate overlooking the Hudson River. On the property we have an animal sanctuary filled with llamas, alpacas, mini donkeys, goats, sheep and pigs, plus an aviary, apiary, and an organic produce field. We were established in 2001 when Bob Pollock purchased and renovated the historic inn to transform the grounds into a relaxing getaway location. Since then, we've become a premier Hudson Valley wedding destination, and escape for corporate retreats and other private events. We can sleep up to 50 guests throughout our 17 unique and historical lodgings. Since February, we've been offering more community events throughout Buttermilk and at Frida's Cafe & Bakery, a sister location to the property!

The Spa

As most people already know, our award-winning spa is currently being renovated and expanding from 6,000 to 18,000 square feet, and will include three infinity pools, a sauna, steam room, nail salon, salt room, twelve treatment rooms, and an indoor/outdoor yoga deck. The spa will re-open by mid- 2024. Our current spa is still open 7 days a week, and all world-class treatments are available (facials, massages, nails)





<u>Henry's at the Farm</u>

Our onsite restaurant, Henry's at the Farm, has won the Hudson Valley's Best Farm to Table restaurant award for four consecutive years. It's current renovations are slated to be complete this August, giving us the capacity of roughly 100 guests, who can also enjoy a private event room and double deck dining patio overlooking our pond.

Less than two hours from Manhattan and an hour south of Albany, with the majestic Hudson River flanking its eastern side, the county is home to 35 peaks and 350 miles of trails ready for outdoor adventure all year long.

Explore world class destinations like the Mohonk Preserve on the Shawangunk Ridge, or reconnect with nature in Catskill Park. Welcome the change in seasons along 75 miles of rail trails that wind through long-forgotten corridors, or be dazzled by river views on the Walkway Over the Hudson.

Indoors, seek out well-known performers or emerging artists at our acclaimed venues, where live theater, iconic music and art of all genres thrives in landmark buildings, intimate spaces and tucked into nature.





Read our blog to keep up with all things happening in Ulster County all year long.



There are literally hundreds of ways to explore the four corners and four seasons of Ulster County. Browse our quaint towns and bustling Main Streets in Woodstock, Kingston, New Paltz, Saugerties and Gardiner to discover new culinary destinations and craft beverage tasting rooms. Shop our eclectic shops and high-end boutiques or scour for vintage. Peel back centuries of multicultural history and old Dutch architecture in the Stockade District, in Hurley or on Historic Huguenot Street. Or, take to the road on the Shawangunk Mountain Scenic Byway or the Catskill Mountain Scenic Byway for thrilling views in any weather.

Discover Miles of Scenic Rail Trails

EMPIRE STATE TRAIL The 750-mile trail stretches from NYC to Buffalo. connecting in Ulster County from the Walkway Over the Hudson in Highland to New Paltz, through Rosendale and on to Kingston. Its multiuse, family-friendly trails wind through forests, under stone bridges, and over creeks and rivers. Stop for a picnic lunch at Black Creek Crossing just outside the hamlet of Highland where the rail bed rises 20 feet above the valley and offers expansive views of Illinois Mountain.

WALKWAY OVER THE HUDSON The eastern end of the Hudson Valley Rail Trail links to the 1.28-mile Walkway Over the Hudson, the world's longest elevated pedestrian bridge suspended 200 feet over the picturesque Hudson River. (Park at Haviland Road in Highland for easy access.) There are plenty of benches and viewing areas. Delve deeper into nature with a detour to the 251acre Franny Reese State Park located on a bluff with fantastic views.

HUDSON VALLEY RAIL TRAIL This 7.1-mile mixed-use, pet-friendly trail starts at the Haviland Road parking lot in the hamlet of Highland, where a circa 1926 steel caboose (open on weekends) is a huge draw for kids who love clambering up the cupola. Adults can learn about the region's railroading history.

WALLKILL VALLEY RAIL TRAIL Access this scenic 22-mile route in New Paltz, where hikers and cyclists of all ages and abilities can follow it south for eight miles to the hamlet of Wallkill, or north for 14 miles through Rosendale to Kingston. The new stone dust surface winds through charming local farms, past historic ironworks, and over the 150-foot Rosendale Railroad Trestle. Great spot for Insta-worthy shots!

RIVER-TO-RIDGE TRAIL A relaxed and scenic trail that traverses across flat farmland and rolling foothills that were once home to the indigenous Munsee Lenape. An easy, 6.2-mile out-and-back jaunt from the village of New Paltz that will take about two hours to complete.

O+W RAIL TRAIL This recreational trail provides a glimpse into the area's canal and railroad history. Within Ulster County, the 16.7 mile portion spans north-south from Kingston to Kerhonkson with multiple entry points and parking areas along the route. Stop in the charming town of High Falls to visit the D&H Canal Museum, dedicated to telling the stories of the people who built, worked and settled alongside the D&H Canal, which was eventually supplanted by the O&W Railroad. Next, amble along the Five Locks Walk, one of the most historic sections of the canal.

ASHOKAN RAIL TRAIL Walk or bike this flat 11.5-mile trail running beside the Ashokan Reservoir between West Hurley and Boiceville for spectacular views of the Catskill Mountains, scenic lookouts and acres of forest and wetlands. There are multiple well-marked entry points and parking lots that allow for distance flexibility. Don't forget the water and snacks!

KINGSTON POINT RAIL TRAIL Perfect for families looking for a relaxing stroll or bike ride along the water, this flat, paved pathway stretches 1.2 miles from Kingston's midtown to the Rondout Creek Waterfront, offering stunning views of the Kingston Point Light House, Hudson River and Rondout Creek Harbor.

Browse Our Downtowns and Dining Districts

SAUGERTIES Derived from the Dutch "little Sawyer" (a nod to its 17th-century lumber industry) Saugerties' quiet yet convivial downtown packs a lot into its Main and Partition Streets. Find a treasure at one of its many thrifts and fleas like the Saugerties Antiques Center and shop boutiques like The Little Blueberry for clothing and jewelry. Caffeine up at Bluestone Coffee Roasting Company, lunch on the patio at Stella's Station or kick back at The Dutch, the neighborhood gastropub serving classic comfort food and craft brews. Book a seat overlooking the **Esopus Falls** for farm-to-table dining at the newly-opened **Blackbarn** Restaurant Hudson Valley.

WOODSTOCK Find peace, love and a baja hoodie among the jumble of eclectic shops, casual cafés and bars along Tinker Street. Kick off the day with sustainable, locally-sourced sustenance at Bread Alone Bakery, Oriole 9 or Caffe. People watch on the Village Green or browse all things vintage at Mowers Flea Market (weekends from mid-May to November). Pop into Candlestock, known for its six-foot candle mountain and coveted handmade tapers.

A unique culinary experience awaits at Silvia Woodstock, then at nightfall, stick around for libations and music at Station Bar & Curio or R&R Taproom, or karaoke at local fave Early Terrible. Listen to your favorite band at Colony Woodstock or eat, drink and dance at The Pearl Moon Café. Tour Bearsville Theater and explore the former studio of greats like Dylan, The Band and Joplin. Take in a live show or dine al fresco by the babbling stream at one of the onsite restaurants.

KINGSTON The first capital of New York (for a short-lived period during the summer of 1777), Kingston remains steeped in history but with an ultracontemporary vibe. Start at the artifact-filled **Hudson River Maritime Museum** at the bottom of Broadway, then stroll the Rondout District. Book a cruise to the Rondout Lighthouse and explore the historic brick structure, accessible only by boat. Stop for a bite at Rosie General on Broadway, or margaritas and Mexican at The Tortilla Taco Bar.

Head uptown to the Stockade District for endless dining options. Sample the eclectic menu on the back deck of Brickmen Kitchen + Bar, nosh on small bites at Chleo with a glass of wine or carb-load at Kingston Bread + Bar. Shoppers can get their fill at shops like Hamilton & Adams (upstate garb) and Blue Byrd's Haberdashery and Music (great hats and classic vinyl), or scour vintage and antiques at Stuff, Lovefield Vintage or Kingston Consignments.

NEW PALTZ This vibrant college town packs loads to see and do in its bustling downtown. Stroll the heart of New Paltz-Church, North Front and Main streets -a haven of eclectic shops and innovative eateries with a vibrant music scene. Hop on the Wallkill Valley Rail Trail at Lagusta's Luscious Café and veer off two blocks north for Dry Fly Coffee Co. where artisanal bread and pastries are baked daily. Browse the Water Street Market shops and artist showrooms like The Cronin Gallery, or stop for a small plate and wine at Jar'd Wine Pub. Catch new works by emerging playwrights at DENIZEN, an intimate 70-seat black box theater, then stop in for a sour ale at Clemson Brothers Brewery across the street.

MARLBORO/MILTON In the heart of the Hudson River Valley, these hamlets in the town of Marlborough are lush with multi-generational farms and vineyards and expansive views of the **Hudson River.** Wake up with coffee and pastries from Frida's Café & Bakery, then wind your way around the region to explore farm-toglass beverages at the family-owned wineries and cideries dotting the landscape. Enjoy a locally-sourced meal at the newly-renovated Henry's at the Farm or savor an old-school dining experience at The Ship Lantern Inn in a historic Revolutionary War building.



Small Town Charm

ELLENVILLE Nestled in the foothills of the Catskill Mountains, the "Hang Gliding Capital of the Northeast" is known the world over for its Cohen's pumpernickel bagels. Stop at Gabby's for a globally-inspired culinary experience, or enjoy locallysourced, sustainable food and a curated selection of wine and craft beverages at Aroma Thyme Bistro.

PHOENICIA Tucked in the northwest corner of the Catskills, this funky little town evokes a frontier vibe. Have a brew at The Sportsman's Alamo Cantina. Shop the Nest Egg, a quaint country store, or find contemporary and rustic home furnishings at **Tender** Land Home. Fuel up with comfort food at the Phoenicia Diner, a bustling mountainside eatery, or flapjacks at Sweet Sue's Phoenicia.

ROSENDALE This charming town once supplied cement from its Rosendale Cement Factory to build the Brooklyn Bridge and the Statue of Liberty. Explore the Widow Jane Mines or visit the 22-acre Snyder Estate. Hike to the Rosendale Trestle, a 900-foot truss bridge overlooking the Rondout Creek, then recharge at the Rail Trail Café with wood-fired pizza and a signature Green Drink. Catch a vintage film at the iconic Rosendale Theater and complete the day with a colossal milkshake at Santa Fe Burger Bar.

SOAK IN SUMMER

Find adventure in Ulster County's Catskill Forest Preserve—its 250,000 acres of mountain wilderness and 1,161 square miles of majestic landscapes are primed for hiking (with more than 190 miles of trails), biking, kayaking, climbing, fishing, camping and so much more. Explore the 71-mile Shawangunk Ridge with over 40,000 acres of natural terrain, and discover swimming holes, pristine mountain lakes and opportunities for extreme experiences like backcountry hiking, hang-gliding, sky diving and mountain climbing.

Plan a summer getaway that's fun for the whole family with kidfriendly activities like pedal biking along a scenic stream bed, taking a trolley ride to the beach or watching a wood-bat baseball game. Visit U-pick berry and wildflower farms, seek out hidden-away places to romp and swim or hit a local fair or vintage car show.

Cool Ways to Beat the Heat

CHILL IN THE HILLS Hike to Awosting Falls just inside Minnewaska State Park for dramatic waterfalls that plunge more than 60 feet into Peter's Kill after the thaw in spring. Once parked, take the short, wooded path meandering alongside the access road to the trailhead for the falls.

The 5,400-acre Sam's Point Preserve includes the most dramatic and highest section of the Shawangunk Mountains, making it the busiest park by far. (Online reservations are required on weekends/holidays.) Hikes can include a combination of carriage roads, trails through blueberry fields, ridge trails with spectacular views and rock scrambles. Kids love the ice caves and the 187-foot Verkeerderkill Falls. The Nature Center offers tips to get around.

Trek over to **Overlook Mountain** near Woodstock, a 4.6-mile out-and-back, moderately challenging route that is popular for its extraordinary views, old hotel ruins and a fire tower. It will take about 2.5 hours to complete the loop, but start out early as the parking lot gets filled by mid-morning during peak season (April-November).

Mountain bike the Shaupeneak Ridge Trail in Ulster Park, a 2.2-mile loop of rugged terrain with vistas to the **Hudson River**, or **Jockey Hill** off Route 28 in Kingston with 25 miles of groomed trails that connect to the Onteora Lake Trails for a longer ride. In Wawarsing, Lippman Park is a mountain biking destination for all levels, with 14 miles of surface for beginners and plenty of berms, jumps and rocky terrain to make it fun and fast for advanced riders.

For an easy, breezy afternoon, head to **Black Creek Preserve** near the town of Esopus. Immerse your senses in the sounds of nature on the well-groomed, 2.1-mile up-and-down hike over a suspension bridge and through the forest to a rocky beach on the Hudson River.



DIVE IN Boat, kayak or paddle past spectacular scenery along Kingston's waterfront in the **Rondout District**. Get outfitted with canoes, electric boats, kayaks or stand-up paddleboards at A Day Away Kayak Rentals.

The upper **Esopus Creek** is known for its easy access to some of the best Class II/III whitewater kayaking and attracts enthusiasts from around the globe. Get your heart pumping as you sweep down rapids and maneuver around rocks, downed trees and ride waves up to three feet high. Put-ins are along High Street in Phoenicia, a sleepy hamlet nestled in the Catskill Forest Preserve. Check for scheduled releases.

Plan a one-of-a-kind kayaking adventure! Rent from I Paddle New York, then suit up at Saugerties Beach for an easy, two-hour paddle along the **Esopus** Bend Nature Preserve. Stop for a swim and let the water games ensue (squirt tubes supplied). New to the sport? Learn kayaking basics from a certified instructor (Tuesday mornings only). Tip: Kids must be three years old and 30+ pounds to ride tandem; or older than 10 to have their own kayak.

Bring your own canoe or kayak to Belleayre Beach at Pine Hill Lake in Pine Hill, where families can also rent pedal boats, swim, fish, boat and hike around the lake from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

HOT PURSUITS **HIDDEN GEMS**

FALLING WATERS PRESERVE

Just a few miles from the heart of Saugerties—and a world away—set aside an hour to wander a 2-mile loop of rugged beauty along wellmarked trails with streams, meadows, wetlands and cascading waterfalls that flow toward the **Hudson River**.

VERNOOY KILL FALLS

Easy access and ample parking mark the start of the 3.5-mile, outand-back Vernooy Kill Falls Trail in Kerhonkson. Traverse rocky streams, babbling brooks and footbridges, and be rewarded with a spectacular waterfall, stone quarry ruins and crystal-clear swimming holes.



SUNDOWN WILD FOREST

Tucked within the secluded wilderness of the Catskill Forest Preserve. find massive rock ledges, lush greenery and pristine water amid 28 verdant acres primed for easy and intermediate hikes.


SOJOURNER TRUTH STATE PARK

Explore 500+ acres of history along a mile of Hudson River coastline in Kingston at this newly developed state park honoring Sojourner Truth, a 19th-century African-American abolitionist and suffragist. Part of the **Empire State Trail** and host to the paved Hudson River Brickyard Trail, the park is a quiet refuge for hikes and private family gatherings.











Top Spots for Epic Adventure

MOHONK PRESERVE Extreme sports enthusiasts should head to the New Paltz and Gardiner areas. Trek across the grounds of the iconic

Mohonk Mountain House resort to the Labvrinth scramble and up the Lemon Squeeze, a 5.5-mile, 4-hour challenge; you'll be rewarded with breathtaking vistas of the Mohonk Preserve. For 360-degree views, climb up the Sky Top Tower, Access to the 40,000-acre forest requires a pre-paid pass, Tip: Plan a weekday climb when the wait at the base will be shorter. (Purchase a parking pass for the day, which also includes hiking, climbing, biking and horseback riding privileges.)

THE GUNKS Located just minutes from New Paltz, the **Shawangunks**, better known as the "Gunks," is one of the most popular climbing destinations in the country, sought for its quartz conglomerate cliffs and distinct horizontal fissures that create adrenaline-pumping challenges for more experienced climbers. Most of the Gunks is located in **Mohonk Preserve** with multiple routes rated at 5.6 or higher that require a minimum of a 60 ft. rope for rappelling.

Two of the most popular cliffs are **The Trapps** and **Near Trapps**. Skilled climbers will opt for the two-pitch Limelight, or the aptly named Ridicullissima, a singlepitch at 180 feet. Tip: For those looking for more experience consider taking a class (from beginner to expert) or hire a guide from Alpine Endeavors.

MINNEWASKA STATE PARK Beginners find the Peterskill Cliffs in Minnewaska State Park easier to access, with bolt anchors and a single-pitch climb. Tip: The number of climbers at Peterskill is limited each day, so get there early to avoid being turned away.

SLIDE/WITTENBERG/CORNELL MOUNTAIN RANGE Experience this 12.3-mile out-and-back trail near Phoenicia. Generally considered a steep and challenging route, this hike is known for its views and is a popular trail for backpacking, camping and hiking. This continuous climb crosses over the summit of three 3,000+ foot peaks with a total elevation gain of 4,504 ft. Tip: Catch the sunrise at Wittenberg.

IN THE AIR If it's airtime you're after, take hang gliding lessons from the certified instructors at Mountain Wings in Ellenville or at Ellenville Flight Park. For heartstopping adventure, Skydive The Ranch in Gardiner boasts the highest skydive in New York and the longest freefall experience in the Northeast.



IN SFASON

U-PICK FARMS

Fill your basket with all sorts of fresh berries (the first ripe fruits of the season) at one of the many U-pick farms in the county. Popular spots include Kelder's Farm, Locust Grove Fruit Farm, Saunderskill Farms. Jenkins-Lueken Orchards and Sonny Weed's Fruit Farm. Check online picking schedules for other vegetables and fruit in season. Tip: Slather on the sunscreen and keep hydrated in the open fields.

•••••• PRIDE MONTH

Kick off a month of celebration at the annual Pride Parade in New Paltz and take part in a wide array of countywide events that include teen talent shows, crosswalk painting, a youth ice-cream social, and more.

HITS ON THE HUDSON

Watch world-class horse shows and competitions in Saugerties against the backdrop of the Catskill Mountains from May to September. Spectator admission is free, parking is plentiful, but rent a golf cart to get around.

CLASSIC CAR SHOW

Join the thousands of spectators who flock to Saugerties every July to see hundreds of classic cars lining Main and Partition streets at the Sawyer Motors Car Show. Shop, dine and bop to non-stop live entertainment it's a day of fun for kids of all ages. Admission is free.

BORSCHT BELT FEST

Get your fill of nostalgia at the Borscht Belt Fest in Ellenville that pays homage to that fabled era when throngs of urban dwellers relocated each summer to sprawling resorts and bungalow colonies in the Catskills, and a vibrant nightlife drew the nation's top entertainers. Relive this iconic period with stand-up comedy, live music, film, panel discussions, street fare and, of course, borscht.

Summertime Family Fun

Head to 200-year-old Kelder's Farm in Kerhonkson for ultimate summer fun. Hop along the oversized jumping pillow, wander

the corn maze, blast apples from cannons and snap photos with the "World's Largest Garden Gnome." At **DuBois Farm** in Highland, playtime includes a mini village and a barnyard farm with horses, goats, llamas, pigs and ducks. Relax with lunch from their pizzeria (panini and salads are also on the menu) and choose from 24 flavors of hand-crafted ice cream.

Take refuge at the Forsyth Nature Center in uptown Kingston, where tykes can feed the goats, watch a peacock fan its feathers and interact with more than two dozen animal exhibits at the free outdoor learning center. Walk to nearby Kinderland for slides, monkey bars, swings and a hide-out house.

Make new family memories at the Rocking Horse Ranch Resort in Highland, where adventure is all inclusive and within walking distance of your room. Rock climbing, horseback riding, tubing, bungee jumpers, mini-golf and a water park are just some of the daytime activities; enjoy bonfires, fireworks displays and live performances at night.

Tour the Catskills on pedal-powered Rail Explorers that run on the tracks of the former Ulster & Delaware Railroad along Esopus Creek. Book a 2- or 4-seater and depart from **Phoenicia Station** for an invigorating, 2.5 hour, 8-mile "River Run." Tip: Rail explorers are limited so book ahead.

The whole family can bike the cross-country trails at **Belleayre Mountain** in Highmount. Access is free to miles of trails for all levels and abilities.

Score big points with sports fans—Saugerties is home to the championship Saugerties Stallions collegiate baseball team. Watch top "wood-bat" teams compete at the Cantine Veterans Memorial Complex for 10 weeks in summer. (Discounts for students and seniors; under 12s are free.)

If it's dusty, loud excitement you're after, head to Accord **Speedway** on Friday nights for the best stock-car racing around. Easy parking, concession stands (think: root beer floats) and special nights with fireworks and vintage coupes make for an ultra-fun family night out.

Load up the car for the **Ulster County Fair** held every August (since 1869) at the Ulster County Fairgrounds in New Paltz. Pay one price that includes Midway rides, carnival games, live entertainment and more.

Road trip! There's nothing more rejuvenating than a quick fall escape—grab your gear, jump in a car or hop on a train and hightail it to Ulster County to enliven your spirit. Spend a crisp autumn day taking part in harvest celebrations at one of the more than 24 U-pick farms open for apples, pears, late berries and pumpkins. Visit a farm market to load up on fresh apple cider donuts then head to any of the 30 craft beverage tasting rooms to warm up.

With over 742,776 acres of land, more than 80% of which is forested, there's no shortage of places to peep vibrant fall foliage. Hike, bike or horseback ride along winding scenic trails or dive into our historic past—from the oldest section in New York's oldest city to historic districts creatively re-envisioned.

Read on to whet your weekend-away appetite, and scan the QR code to explore even more.

Best Places to Peep Fall Foliage

SHAWANGUNK SCENIC BYWAY Load up the car or hop on a motorcycle for a vivid foliage excursion along this byway that winds through 88 miles of scenery, connecting on two different loops as you head north. Start at the vibrant village of New Paltz, with its farm-to-table eateries and local music scene, then head west through the Shawangunk Ridge, where the elevation rises 2,200 feet above sea level. Follow Routes 44/55 to Kerhonkson and the charming rural town of Stone Ridge before looping back. Hops and spirits lovers should head to Arrowood Farms in Accord for a seasonal take on regenerative farming and freshair dining at the pavilion bar or Apiary Restaurant.

A southern route traverses from **Kerhonkson** through the **Rondout Valley**, with views of the ridge as you travel to Ellenville, passing through the Minnewaska State Park Preserve, the quaint hamlet of Cragsmoor and through bucolic farmland into the town of Shawangunk and Pine Bush.

CATSKILL MOUNTAIN SCENIC BYWAY The 52-mile-long stretch passes through the quaint towns of Olive and Shandaken, winding through small hamlets to the wild and pristine Catskill Preserve. Detour to the Ashokan Reservoir and find a quiet bench to inhale the views and marvel at this engineering triumph developed in the early 20th century to hold billions of gallons of water for New York City's growing metropolis. The Maurice D. Hinchey Catskill Interpretive Center in Mount Tremper is a must-stop—it's chock full of resources for things to do along the route.

ON THE WATER Prefer not to drive? Soak in the glorious foliage along the waterfront with a two-hour cruise up the Hudson River on the Rip Van Winkle II, starting in Kingston, past views of the Catskill Mountains, sprawling historic estates, lighthouses and sleepy villages. Tip: Fall excursions sell out fast, so purchase tickets at least one week in advance.

HIKE FOR VIEWS At an elevation of 1,812 feet, Gertrudes Nose (named after Gertrude Bruyn, a 17th-century settler who donated much of the land) is one of the most popular hikes in Minnewaska State Park, known for its unique rock formations and dramatic foliage views over expanses of farmland and forest. Hike in on the trails (Millbrook Mountain Loop is the most popular) or use the easier, flatter carriage roads to reach Gertrude's Nose. Epic selfies await!

Sips with a View

Prepare your palate for a scenic tour around the Shawangunk Wine Trail nestled between the Shawangunk Mountains and the Hudson River. Cluster a day's tastings in the Marlboro area, with stops at Benmarl Winery, Stoutridge Winery & Distillery and Weed Orchards,

then watch the sun slip over the river at Quartz Rock Vineyards, high atop Mount Zion. Nearby Nostrano Vineyards' 75-acre farm, nestled in the rolling hills of Milton, offers small-batch wines and expansive bird's-eye views.

Wind your way through Gardiner to **Tuthilltown Spirits Distillery** on the site of an old grist mill, or savor estate-grown vegan wines at Whitecliff Vineyards and Bruynswick Winery at the base of the Shawangunks.

Pick apples and enjoy orchard ciders at Bad Seed Hard Cider's popular, kid- and puppy-friendly taproom in Highland, and at Brooklyn Cider House at Twin Star Orchards in New Paltz (leashed dogs are welcome), where scratch-made fare will satisfy even the pickiest eaters. Browse the harvest market and sample farm-based English ciders at Hudson Valley Farmhouse Cider in Stone Ridge.



Explore more craft beverages

IN SFASON

HARVEST FUN

Head to any of the sprawling farms and orchards in the county to get your fill of fall. Local faves include: Westwind Orchard, Dressel Farms, Hurd Family Farm, Weed Orchards, DuBois Farms and Wightman Fruit Farm.

Get lost in the 3-acre corn maze or hop on a hay ride at Wallkill View Farm in New Paltz. On weekends, take a hay ride or explore the sunflower maze at Seed Song Farm in Kingston. Tailgate at Wright's Farm in Gardiner amid 453 acres of breathtaking views, then hit the onsite Gardiner Brewery. Or, stomp grapes at Robibero Winery in New Paltz then relax with estate-grown wines around an outdoor fire pit.



HAUNTED ACTIVITIES

For the ultimate scary fun, head to Headless Horseman Haunted Attractions in Ulster Park for an immersive, heart-pounding experience. Or, book the Boos & Brews Haunted Tours of Historic Huguenot Street and explore the legendary street's chilling tales with a local craft beverage.

••••• **FALL ADVENTURE TRAINS**

Embark on a spectacular journey on the Catskill Mountain Railroad's Fall Foliage Adventure Train, which travels through the Catskills along the former Ulster & Delaware Railroad corridor. Rides leave from Kingston Plaza in September and October for an 8-mile, round-trip excursion. Book the Pumpkin Express and choose a pumpkin on board to take home.









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Fall for History

KINGSTON STOCKADE DISTRICT Named for the stockade built by Dutch governor Peter Stuyvesant in the mid-1600s, the uptown Kingston Stockade District is a close-knit, 8-block neighborhood that blends colonial American history and small-town charm with a bustling retail scene.

Get acclimated at the Matthewis Persen House Museum on John Street, one of oldest structures in the District, then head to the Senate House State Historic **Site**, the first seat of New York government where the state's first Constitution was adopted in 1777. Browse artifacts next door at the Senate House Museum. Explore the heart of the Dutch settlement on a self-guided walking tour (download a map or pick one up at the Friends of Historic Kingston Gallery on Main Street), or download the Kingston Walks Audio Tour on your smartphone.

HURLEY HISTORIC DISTRICT Stretching for 250 acres on both sides of U.S. Route 209, the Hurley Historic District is a prime destination for some of the best-preserved colonial Dutch architecture in the country. Dive into 350 years of the settlement's history at the Hurley Heritage Society museum on Main Street. Pick up a map (or download one) and take a self-guided walking tour of the picturesque village.

Nature lovers can explore more of the hamlet on the paved, mixed-use O&W Rail Trail. Park on Russell Road in Hurley to stroll or bike the 13-mile route that runs along U.S. Route 209 to Stone Ridge and High Falls. In High Falls, follow the halfmile Five Locks Walk that follows a towpath along the canal.

HISTORIC HUGUENOT STREET Walk down one of America's oldest streets in this 10-acre National Historic Landmark District in New Paltz, tucked away from the college-town buzz. Explore 300 years of multicultural history on Historic Huguenot Street. The journey begins at the DuBois Fort Visitor Center (park in the lot on Broadhead Avenue), where you can register for a guided tour (limited to eight people; pre-registration is encouraged) and browse exhibits on the settlement's evolution. Visit the museum shop there, too.

If you opt for the unguided tour, download the free app to learn about each site as you explore the District's seven stone house museums, including the flagship Jean Hasbrouck House, a reconstructed 1717 French church, an exact replica of an Esopus Munsee wigwam and a historic burial ground.

FALL FAVES **HIDDEN GEMS**

BRUNEL SCULPTURE PARK

Tucked away off the Catskill Scenic Byway in the town of Olive, embrace the visual beauty of indigenous horticulture on a self-guided tour of this 4-acre artistic sanctuary.

THE FALCON

Perched over Marlboro Falls, listen to world-class jazz, blues or rock by Grammy-winning artists and local musicians at this iconic venue (no tickets needed—just reserve a table for dinner) or visit the "pub-beneaththe-club," home to Avalon Archives Museum of Rock & Roll.



SAUGERTIES LIGHTHOUSE

Hike to the remote 1850s lighthouse on a half-mile nature trail, open sunrise to sunset, or turn the clock back to when steamboats traveled the Hudson River and book a stay at the restored, red-brick B&B surrounded by water and furnished as it was in the early 20th century.

BELLEAYRE MOUNTAIN

Take a gondola to the top of the mountain during the off-season (park in the upper lot of the ski resort) for spectacular autumnal views of the Catskill Mountains. Walk the trails under the dormant ski lifts or set up a picnic lunch at the base and imagine the activity once the snow falls!

Best Ways to Weather the Cold

HIT THE TRAILS It's prime time for cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and fat biking, and most rail trails in Ulster County are open

for a good winter workout with scenic, rustic views. Head to the popular Hurley Rail Trail, a 3-mile-long, 10-foot-wide path that stretches along the Esopus Creek to Kerhonkson along the old O&W Railway. (The trailhead is on the left just after you cross the creek.) XC in fresh snow at Minnewaska State Park on five groomed trails that boast some of the best elevation gain in the region (1,079 feet total ascent on the Upper Awosting loop). Weather permitting, the River-to-Ridge Trail in New Paltz offers easy access for all levels and beautiful winter views of the Shawangunk Ridge.

ON THE SLOPES Belleayre Mountain in Highmount, a winter destination since 1947, has 170+ skiable acres, lodges, group and private lessons and eight lifts, including a high-speed gondola. Cross-country skiers and off-road-ready fat bikes are welcome on a network of thrilling trails groomed for every level, from gentle carriage roads to steep, challenging drops.

Reserve a date at Kidscamp Belleayre and introduce your kids under 12 to skiing or snowboarding. Kid-friendly instructors run four-hour group lessons on weekends and holidays, so beginners can get acclimated to the terrain and progress to the 220-foot "Magic Carpet." Tip: For the quickest access, park at the base at the Discovery Lodge where check-in begins at 8 a.m.

ON THE ICE Hit the Rondout Ice Rink at Ole Savannah, quintessential for skating on the waterfront in Kingston. Stay for the southern hospitality and relish the comfort food from their extensive menu, or get a family-sized meal to go.

Glide on an Olympic-sized rink indoors at Kiwanis Ice Arena in Saugerties. It's fully-enclosed and open daily from September to April. Or, splurge on a two-hour weekday pass and lace up at the rustic Mohonk Ice Skating Pavilion, perched high above the lake atop the Mohonk Mountain House property. Rest tired legs with a ride on an ice chariot and warm up in front of the massive stone fireplace. Tip: Come unencumbered; only small cubbies are available to hold your shoes while you skate.

Trout season comes to a close at the end of November in Ulster County, but hardcore enthusiasts can ice fish at places like Sturgeon Pool east of Rosendale, Rondout Creek in Eddyville and Onteora Lake west of Kingston, Polar-bear anglers can spend all winter casting at various lakes, rivers, streams and reservoirs, including the **Hudson River** (eel), the **Ashokan Reservoir** (walleye) and Esopus Creek (black bass). Tip: Stay apprised of weather conditions and know the rules and regulations.

Must-do Family Fun

A Frosty Fest in Ulster Park is an annual spectacular displaying over one million lights and 12 holiday attractions, with live entertainment, gift shops and more. Don't miss photos with Santa! Tip: Reservations are recommended; to skip the crowds, visit early in the season or on Fridays or Sundays.

Get whisked away to the North Pole on the Catskill Mountain Railroad's Polar Express, departing from Kingston beginning in mid-November. Reserve a Golden Ticket for assigned seating in one of the 1950s vintage coaches and delight in on-board entertainment, caroling, hot chocolate and cookies during this magical ride. Limited space is available for those with sensory sensitivities.








AWAKEN TO SPRING


Refresh, reconnect. Learn something new. As nature starts to thaw and wildflowers begin to bloom, find refuge and calm in 1,100 square miles of woodlands and open space that beckon nature lovers and forest bathers. Renew your spirit and explore scenic vistas and rushing waterfalls, or rejuvenate at a rural resort or mountain retreat. Take to the tee or learn to fly fish in the pristine waters of the Catskills Preserve.

As the temperature warms, witness art and community come alive in Ulster County, where theater, music and art of all genres thrives in landmark buildings, intimate spaces and tucked into nature.

Best Places to Reconnect with Nature

WOODLAND WALKS Get lost in the 60-acre forest and sculpture park at Opus 40 in Saugerties, and explore the 6.5 acres of

monumental earthwork created by pioneering artist Harvey Fite. Chill out on the lawn with live music and farm-to-table food truck fare on Stockade Saturday evenings, or pack a picnic and take in a performance on Sunday afternoons with the majestic Catskill Mountains as the backdrop.

Tap your inner zen at the John Burroughs Nature Sanctuary in Esopus, a tranquil oasis of 4.5 miles of easy-to-moderate trails that traverse rocky ridge lines, woodlands and wetlands with a 2-acre pond, fern valley, stone stairway and a cliff-clinging ladder. Revel in the lush landscapes that inspired Burroughs and fellow naturalists like Walt Whitman and Theodore Roosevelt, and peek inside Slabsides, the rustic one-story log cabin Burroughs built in 1895.

AMONG THE FLORA Bliss out at one of Ulster County's stunning wildflower farms, which come alive with spring blossoms. Stroll through six acres of tulips in May at Kelder's Farm in Kerhonkson, then refresh with locally-crafted beer, wine or cider on tap at the farm's **The Loading Dock**. Reserve boho seating or a picnic table at Hudson Wildflower Co. in Milton and soak up sunny vibes amid lush flower fields. Stay at Auberge Resort's Wildflower Farms in Gardiner where you'll discover an understated, authentic back-to-nature escape, set on 140 acres with clear views of the Shawangunk Ridge. Stay in free-standing cabins, and book an "experience" from farm foraging to hiking to distillery tours.

Witness biodiversity in action at the Shawangunk Grassland National Wildlife **Refuge** in Wallkill. Stroll through the 597-acre green space to catch glimpses of diverse migratory birds and other rare wildlife that find refuge here. Two interconnected trails make a 3.6-mile loop through open grasslands plush with native grasses and views of the majestic Shawangunk Ridge. Tip: Early birds literally get the parking spaces here, so head out early.

ON THE FLY An abundance of lakes, rivers and creeks, and ideal weather conditions make Ulster County a favorite destination for fishing (especially trout). Esopus Creek is a go-to spot for anglers, with good wading levels and a variety of brown, rainbow and brook trout. The Ashokan Reservoir is stocked with fish and a rewarding place for casual fishing from shore or boat. Rondout Creek is a sprawling tributary of the Hudson River creating perfect trout fishing conditions all spring and summer long. Public access to some portions of the creek (north of the reservoir) is limited, which makes it coveted for serious anglers. With boat launch sites in Kingston, Esopus and Saugerties, opportunities abound along the Hudson River, with plenty of bait-and-tackle shops, fishing guides, restaurants and amenities nearby.

ON THE TEE Pack your clubs for one of Ulster County's 10 scenic public courses known for their world-class design. Tee up at familyowned **Apple Greens Golf Course**, a 27-hole course beloved by locals for its fairways intertwined with apple orchards and stunning views of the Catskills and Shawangunk Mountains. (Load up your golf cart with free apples in October.)

For a historic outing book tee time at the private Woodstock Golf Club (proof of out-of-town license and local lodging receipt required) and end the par 70, 18-hole course with a walk over the rushing Sawkill Creek and dinner at the five-star Millstream. If you only have time for nine, head to the New Paltz Golf Course. This challenging par-36 course is located close to Historic Huguenot Street, a district of stone house museums built by early settlers.

Top Destinations for Art and Culture

KINGSTON Explore the city's three distinct areas for a wide range of art and cultural events. Converge with other art lovers in midtown on the first Saturday of every month when more than two dozen galleries open new exhibits to the public, or dive into photography at the new home of the Center for Photography at Woodstock. Catch a national act at the 1,500-seat Ulster Performing Arts Center (UPAC), a national landmark and one of New York's last great show palaces. Downtown, the West Strand Art Gallery on the waterfront exhibits contemporary works, and ArtPort Kingston is a must-stop for nontraditional exhibits housed inside the historic Cornell Steamboat Co. building. Book a jazz or classical performance at colonial uptown's **Senate Garage**.

SAUGERTIES Embrace the uniqueness of **Opus 40**, the life's work of sculptor Harvey Fite, a permanent art installation on 6.5 acres of a former bluestone guarry that provides a monumental setting for live music, theater, dance, yoga and outdoor classes. Catch the sunset over the Catskills on Community Thursdays, or take a guided tour of the pristine property on weekends.

Dive into the emerging art scene in the center of the eclectic Saugerties village. including Jane Street Art Center, which showcases multidisciplinary art in two 19th-century brick buildings (including the former J. J. Newberry department store), and Emerge Gallery & Art Space, which features works by local artists that can be purchased on the spot.

NEW PALTZ Find world-class art at the **Dorsky Museum at SUNY New Paltz**, tucked behind the campus's iconic glass and metal **Atrium**. Six galleries are housed in 9,000 square feet of exhibit space, each filled with diverse works meant to spark curiosity and critical thinking. The DM Weil Gallery offers the look and vibe of a Soho-style exhibition space with the majestic Shawangunk Mountains as a backdrop. Catch new works by emerging playwrights at DENIZEN's intimate black box theater and stroll galleries at Water Street Market and along Main Street.

WOODSTOCK Feel an immediate connection to Woodstock's deep artistic roots on Tinker Street; there are dozens of galleries teeming with pottery, paintings, jewelry, photography and more. In its center is the Woodstock Artists Association & Museum (WAAM), where Woodstock's heritage as the "Colony of the Arts" is on display.

Channel Woodstock's musical heritage at Bearsville Theater, a center of creativity for music icons as far back as the 60s. Take in a show or gather at **Bearsyille Park**. an oasis for dining, drinking and relaxing with live music along the Sawkill Creek. Step back in time at the Colony for a curated line-up of live music and upscale pub food in the intimate circa 1929 hotel ballroom or outdoors in the beer garden. Catch a live performance at the 70-seat Barn at Levon Helm Studios, a one-of-akind musical landmark and home of the Midnight Ramble.

HIDDEN GEMS

NYQUIST-HARCOURT WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

Relish 56 acres of "forever wild" nature with over 1.300 feet of frontage views of the Wallkill River, an "oxbow" of ponds and wetlands and wild meadows of grasses and herbaceous plants.

CATSKILL OUTFITTERS

If you're new to fly fishing or would prefer a guided experience, Catskill Outfitters in Phoenicia offers organized fishing expeditions with all equipment supplied, and licensed guides to ensure a good catch. Get your handmade ties ready!

WOODSTOCK PLAYHOUSE

This legendary theater at the Gateway to Woodstock has staged plays, concerts and other performances since 1938, including a pivotal precursor to Woodstock '69. Catch a live performance in an intimate setting at this historical mecca beginning in May each year.



FARM MARKETS

Find the best of the Hudson Valley's hand-crafted and farm fresh products at the Stone Ridge Farmers & Makers Market in Stone Ridge, Sundays from May through December.

Local farm produce and community spirit abound uptown at the Kingston Farmers Market open Saturdays catskillyear-round from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the County Courthouse parking lot.

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
